## The Police and Crime Plan for Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly




The Police and Crime Plan for Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly was written by The Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.

The plan explains how the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) and partners will work together to make Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly a safe place to live and work in.

A message from Alison Hernandez Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC):

Devon, Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly is one of the safest areas in the country.



We have worked with **community partners** to make the region a low crime area. Violence remains an issue.



You have told me that you wanted to see:

1. More police officers in your community



2. Action to tackle drugs



3. Action to tackle antisocial behaviour



4. Safer roads



This plan looks at those areas. It focusses on public and community safety.



#### Violence:



We know that we need to support families and young people who have been affected by violence.




#### We will:

- Tackle violence against women and children
- Look at the causes of domestic and sexual violence
- Provide support to victims of violence through commissioning specialist services



We will know that this is working if we see a drop in the number of:







 People under 25 who have been admitted into hospital with stab wounds



- Offences committed with a gun
- Violent crimes committed
- · Victims supported after a crime



## Antisocial behaviour (ASB):

Antisocial behaviour upsets people and can affect their health, wellbeing and quality of life.



The police, local councils, other agencies and communities need to work together to stop antisocial behaviour from happening.




This includes tackling drug problems.



#### We will:

- Work to make people feel safer in city, town and village centres
- Ensure victims of ASB are listened to and know how to get help





We will know that this is working if we see a drop in the number of:

- ASB incidents recorded
- Public order incidents



## Drugs:



Drugs can have a devastating impact on community life and those who are addicted to them.



Drug abuse affects individuals, families, businesses and can lead to violence, crime, money problems and homelessness.



#### We will:

• Encourage people to report drug dealing to the police or Crimestoppers



• Ensure that the Chief Constable treats drug dealing as a serious issue and that officers respond quickly to drug offences



 Raise awareness of the county lines threat (where vulnerable people are told to transport drugs into towns and cities)




 Support community partners to share information with the police and best practice



## Road safety:



There are too many crashes on our roads. Whilst this region is one of the safest when it comes to road safety we believe that any serious injury or death is one too many.



#### We will:

 Encourage new projects looking to improve road safety



 Work with communities on schemes such as Operation Snap and Community Speedwatch



 Work to reduce death and serious injuries on our roads



We will know that this is working if we see a drop in the number of:

- Deaths
- Serious injuries

## Safe:

Make our area the safest place in the country by focussing (looking at/working on) violence, antisocial behaviour, drugs and road safety.



#### Resilient:

Give communities the tools (information, schemes, plans) and knowledge they need to keep themselves safe and recover from crime.



#### Connected:

Build confidence by providing more officers on the street policing our communities.



People are at the heart of this plan. I will work hard to understand people's needs to ensure that those who need our help get it. I want police officers to pursue criminals and work to reduce crimes.

## Services for victims:



Being a victim of crime can leave people feeling ill, anxious, depressed and afraid to do the things they did before.




Some victims of crime may not want to report this to the police but still need support from victim services. This is why the PCC commissions services for people who can choose who they want to report to.
