### Police and Crime Plan Initiatives in Cornwall

- **Tri Service Officers:** located in 10 areas - St Just, Hayle, Bude, Liskeard, Looe, St Dennis, Fowey/Polruan, Perranporth, St Ives, Lostwithiel
- **Road Safety** – 28 additional roads policing officers across D&C including a No Excuses Team in Bodmin, dedicated Road Casualty Reduction Officers for Cornwall and Highways England Network. Renewing of Community Speedwatch and investment in systems and services to support growth.

## OPCC Commissioning and Grants Specific to Cornwall:

Funding	2018/19 Allocation
<b>Community Safety Partnership (CSP)</b>	<b>Cornwall CSP received: £448,636</b> – helping to fund a number of key services including; Sexual violence and Domestic Abuse, Safeguarding and Substance Misuse. This funding has been used as follows: £277,794 – domestic violence and sexual abuse services £9000 – domestic homicide reviews £130,436 – substance misuse services £16,500 – CSP intelligence and analysis £14,906 – training for professionals and communities on threats
<b>Safer Towns Programme launched by Cornwall CSP</b>	In January 2018 the PCC committed <b>£50,000</b> seed funding contribution to support the 10 Safer Towns: Bodmin, Camborne, Falmouth, Liskeard, Newquay, Penzance, Redruth, Saltash, St Austell and Truro. Each town was awarded: £5000 to each scheme.
<b>Shopwatch Growth</b>	In January 2018 the PCC committed funding in the sum of <b>£9,000</b> to enable the growth of Shopwatch by the Business Improvement Districts (BIDs) in St Austell, Penzance and Truro.
<b>Youth Offending Service</b>	<b>Cornwall Youth Offending Team received: £160,224</b> - The PCC intends to maintain funding at the 2017-18 level for two financial years to ensure service delivery in this area can be maintained.
<b>Connectivity Innovation Fund 2018</b>	Connectivity Funding has been awarded to the following projects in Cornwall: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Electric bicycles</b> – Bodmin and Wadebridge: £3000</li> <li>• <b>Migrant workers welcome pack</b> – Cornwall (used force wide): £2500</li> <li>• <b>Phones and tablet to assist social media engagement with community and businesses</b> – Bodmin: £1600</li> <li>• <b>Items for rural engagement surgeries</b> – Penzance: £2500</li> <li>• <b>Maritime safeguarding team</b> – to support coastal safety education - Newquay &amp; force wide: £2000</li> </ul>

<b>Marine Specials – Fowey</b>	PCC has provided £6,500 for the required equipment and training to enable the relaunch and continued operation of the Marine Specials Unit in Fowey.
<b>Community Speedwatch</b>	PCC has provided £9,000 funding to LPA Commander to purchase community speedwatch equipment for existing schemes and to support new schemes

## Wider OPCC Commissioning and Grants

The following commissioning activities benefit all areas across Devon and Cornwall:

Independent Sexual Violence Advocacy Service (ISVA) and SARC Service	£343,610 of funding has been provided by the PCC (includes £83,610 contribution from NHS England).
Mental Health Street Triage and Mental Health Neighbourhood Liaison & Diversion	£250,000 provided by PCC to support crisis response from policing on mental health.
<p>Victims Services Grant from the Ministry of Justice:</p> <p>The PCC receives a ring-fenced amount based on a national population formula of 2.97% for the Devon, Cornwall and Isles of Scilly area.</p>	<p><b>In 2018/19, the PCC received £1,875,543 Victims Services Grant and £139,862 CSA/CSE Grant so in total: £2,015,267.</b></p> <p>The Victim Services Grant is used to provide essential support and establishes victim care arrangements. The funding received is utilised to fund in excess of 70 third sector organisations providing tailored support to victims according to need. Examples of Cornwall service providers include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Citizens Advice</b> – St Austell, Truro, Liskeard and Penzance: Provide independent, confidential and impartial advice to individuals.</li> <li>• <b>Clear</b> – Truro: Offer long term support to victims of child sexual exploitation and their families including those who are vulnerable and at risk of exploitation.</li> <li>• <b>Cornwall People First</b> – Penzance: Provide support to adults with a learning disability who have been a victim of a crime.</li> <li>• <b>Cornwall Rape &amp; Sexual Abuse Centre (CRASAC)</b> – Truro: Offers counselling and support service to anyone that has been raped, sexually abused or sexually assaulted.</li> <li>• <b>Zito Partnership</b> – Support victims of violent crime, providing information and advice to enable people to cope and recover from their experience.</li> </ul>
Ministry of Justice funded Outreach Support Service	The OPCC were awarded £234,238 for a pilot to deliver an Outreach Support Service for women across Devon & Cornwall which is funded until March 2020. The funding has been divided equally across the three organisations that form the OPCC created Alliance. In Cornwall this is: Women's Centre Cornwall (Bodmin) who will employ 2 workers to cover North and South Cornwall.
Crimestoppers Manager for Devon and Cornwall	The PCC has provided £20,000 funding per annum to support the appointment of a dedicated Crimestoppers Manager to work with local communities and Crimestoppers volunteers in D&C to enhance the presence and impact of Crimestoppers locally and to support local community campaigns. The new manager took up their post in December 2018.
